KIM POWELL'S MISSION TO SERVE

In the world of healthcare, some professionals go beyond simply treating patients. They dedicate their lives to making care accessible to those who need it most. Kim Powell is one such provider. Her journey from aspiring lawyer to passionate physician assistant has been defined by a deep commitment to underserved communities.

Kim's transformation began with a pivotal trip to The Gambia after college. What was meant to be a clear career path toward law was abruptly shifted when she felt a deeper calling to mission-based work. This experience led her to become a physician assistant specializing in family practice at Augusta Health's neighborhood clinics.

"Being out in the community and providing care that people can count on is very important for anyone who can't or won't travel to a doctor's office," Kim explains. Her work focuses on patients who are often overlooked, including people who are unhoused, formerly incarcerated, or otherwise marginalized. These clinics serve as critical lifelines, offering medical care to those who might otherwise fall through the cracks.

Kim understands the profound impact of accessible healthcare. "Having access to care, just being evaluated for routine health issues, can help someone keep their life on track," she says. She often sees how untreated problems spiral into larger physical or mental health challenges, underscoring the importance of preventive and consistent care.

The road that led to this exciting launch was paved by generosity. Since April of 2024, community donors contributed \$600,000 to Augusta Health Foundation to make the mobile medical unit a reality. When I woke up, my car was destroyed, and I was being rushed to the nearest hospital—which, fortunately, was the region's #1 trauma center. They saved my life, but my wife didn't make it.

When I was strong enough, what I wanted most was to continue my recovery at Augusta Health. I spent nearly five months in Skilled Nursing and Rehab, and what I found there went far beyond medical treatment. The team there – the doctors and especially the amazing nurses, in the skilled nursing wing, and the fabulous physical, occupational, and speech therapists, never let me quit—they gave me hope, strength, and a reason to keep going.

The hospital in Tennessee may have saved me, but Augusta Health helped me rebuild my life. That's why I'm making a donation to the Foundation, to honor the people who go the extra mile for patients like me.

Staying Power

INVESTING IN THE FUTURE OF CARE



Dr. Alexander Nguyen's journey to medicine began early. As the son of Vietnamese refugees, he grew up in Northern Virginia and became the first in his family to attend college. His passion for healthcare was ignited during trips to Vietnam with his parents to volunteer in orphanages, where he first envisioned becoming a doctor.

After earning his medical degree from Liberty University College of Osteopathic Medicine, Dr. Nguyen sought a residency close to home. He found a perfect fit at Augusta Health—a hospital known for its supportive culture, rural charm, and commitment to community care. "I always knew residency would be tough," he says. "But here, when I drive to work at 5:30 a.m. and it's still dark, it feels like I'm heading to see friends. That culture has made all the difference."

Augusta Health's Graduate Medical Education (GME) program is unique for a community hospital. Typically seen in large teaching institutions, GME programs help expand patient access while training future physicians. In just a few years, the program has improved care in the Valley, especially through the residents' Community Clinic, which has enhanced access for over 1,400 local patients.

Donations to the program through the Foundation have been crucial to this success, providing call rooms, professional growth for residents, and endowed funds for faculty and resident continuing education. "The support from the Foundation is felt daily in very real ways," Dr. Nguyen says. "It's a big reason why many of us plan to stay once our training is complete."

Full Circle

THE POWER OF WOMEN GIVING TOGETHER



When Kathy Denney talks about community, it's not an abstract idea. Born and raised in Waynesboro, she remembers when the hospital was still Waynesboro Community Hospital—an institution close to her family because her father and uncle both served on the board. From an early age, she understood that a community hospital is more than a building; it is the cornerstone of health and well-being.

So when the concept of a women's giving circle was introduced in 2017, Kathy immediately saw its promise: a group of women learning about Augusta Health's impact and pooling their resources to do even more. That year, she joined nearly 20 others as a founding member of Augusta Health Foundation's Women's Giving Circle.

From the beginning, the Circle proved that collective generosity could spark powerful change. Their first project funded a Forensics Room in the Emergency Department, creating a safe space for victims of sexual assault. Since then, members have helped bring 3-D mammography technology to the area, supported the Breast Center at the Outpatient Pavilion, and most recently, contributed to the launch of Augusta Health's Mobile Medical Unit.

Kathy and her husband, Ron, were high-school sweethearts who returned to Augusta County after college, raised two children, and later downsized to Staunton. Today, they enjoy traveling the globe to visit grandchildren. For Kathy, the Women's Giving Circle is a meaningful way to stay connected locally, blending her lifelong appreciation for community healthcare with friendships and a shared mission.

"Women have a heart for this kind of service," Kathy says. "And I believe we really are making a difference where it matters most."
